Reader's Ramblings

Love and greetings for the 'Merry Month of May' from my Ipswich suburban home to your beautiful corner of the Suffolk countryside, with its lanes, fields, views, and its two vibrant communities, bounded by the idyllic Deben estuary.

I was a ten-year-old fanatical church-crawler and new to Felixstowe, when I alighted from the 201 bus at Trimley's Banks's Corner (immortalising Canon Sherbrooke Banks, who had lived at the nearby rectory), and walked down the lane signposted 'Kirton 1½, Falkenham 2', passing the 'United District School', and descending into Kirton's idyllically-set church through the tower door. A lady in my previous (Hertfordshire) village who had grown up in Kirton, had told me about the remarkable Reverend Weir (who in my later teens called me a young upstart after a remark of mine at a meeting which clashed with his ultra-Protestant views)! I then proceeded to Falkenham and gained my first sight of this gem of a church, with its magnificent tower, in its sequestered setting.

I loved the amazing views from the road to Falkenham, across the Deben valley, and my first mouthwatering sight of a mysterious, isolated, far-off round-towered church on the other side, which turned out to be Ramsholt's. I later discovered that you get a lovely view of it up-river from Falkenham churchyard and that the footpaths at the end of Park Lane will bring you opposite where it has stood for maybe 1000 years, remote, elevated and beautiful, on the other side.

I remember this as I travel each month to conduct Ramsholt's BCP Matins and preach from their three-decker pulpit for the occupants (14 in March and 19 in February) of the box-pews. I always ring the bell violently before the service, hoping that the wind may carry it across the river to tell my own parishes that I'm thinking of them. As I leave, I stand in the porch to marvel at one of the best views in Suffolk, down the river to Felixstowe, and across it to our parishes.

Do go and find this amazing, open and welcoming little church in its sequestered spot 0.6 miles along its little lane. It is a gem and you'll not forget your visit to it! **'But, hang on'** you may say, **'Shouldn't your article really be about God'?** Oh, but it is - all of it! The older I get, the more I see God in the beauty of Creation, in the wonder and sanctity of our amazing churches (which brought me to my knees as a lad), and in the faces of people (cos Jesus said so), whoever and whatever they may be - and I am amazed! May God bless you, Roy T.

K & F Gardeners' club

This month the garden club kick off their summer programme on May 8th with a visit to Holmwood Cottages in Polstead. Its always good to get out and visit other peoples gardens not only to gain some inspiration and see what grows well but also to just admire and spend some time with like minded people.

You would think that at my age I would have learned but after the stresses of opening my garden last summer I have agreed to do it again! However, the fine and lovely April has allowed us all to get out into our gardens earlier this year so I feel I am making good progress already even if it does mean that the grass and weeds have made an early start to match. The mild weather has thrown me a bit this year. I've had to water pots already and I keep looking at plants and thinking they are not very big yet and then remembering that its still early in the year and I shouldn't be expecting flowers for several months. its also been tempting to plant things out already thinking there will be no more frost. That's the thing about gardening. Mother nature is always throwing something different at us every year to keep us on our toes and stop us from being complacent.

Last year I put aside an area to grow some flowers for cutting and it worked reasonably well although I have learnt that more staking is necessary. I plan to expand that this year and so the greenhouse is full of seedlings, bulbs and Daliah tubers bursting into life. There is nothing quite like putting an arrangement of your own flowers in the house and I like the continuity of the link back to the stately homes of the past, where the flowers were grown in the kitchen garden and greenhouses and then picked and arranged in the house by the head gardener. Its only a shame that I am cook, housekeeper and laundry maid as well! British grown cut flowers are definitely on trend. At the April meeting Steve

Medley at Roselea Nursery commented that they had sold an increasing amount of cut flowers last year, Sarah Raven has made it trendy amongst gardeners and at Deben Flower Club we see more and more demonstrators brining local grown



flowers and talking about using them for weddings etc. It certainly is more environmentally friendly than lots of airmiles but also more personally satisfying I feel.

Jobs for May include

Watch out for viburnum beetle and lily beetle grubs and remove by hand if causing damage (if you can catch them!)

Prune spring shrubs, such as forsythia and chaenomeles, after flowering to keep them compact

Reduce your snail populations by going on regular evening hunts, especially during damp weather

Divide established clumps of hostas as they come into growth.

Trim back spreading plants such as aubrieta, alyssum and Iberis after they've flowered, to encourage fresh new growth and more blooms.

Towards the end of the month, keep an eye out for powdery mildew on flowering shrubs and flowers, like rhododendrons. Treat with fungicide to prevent further spread. At

Lift forget-me-nots to prevent heavy self-seeding and reduce spreading.

And on the veg plot

Earth up potatoes as they grow to protect early shoots from frost damage but also to ensure the developing potatoes aren't exposed to light which turns them green and poisonous. Steve pointed out that this is why they sell potatoes at Roselea with soil on them as it helps to prevent them from going green even though some shoppers don't like it.

Start sowing dwarf and climbing French beans, as well as runner beans, directly outdoors in warm weather Hang pheromone traps in apple and plum trees from May to July, to control pests Lets hope May is as kind as April and we don't get any nasty

The Annual Parish Meeting is not a Parish Council Meeting as such, as its aim is to report back to parishioners, rather than to conduct normal business. This year's meeting took place on 8th April, with over thirty in attendance, the main attraction being a presentation on how Bentley successfully achieved the purchase of their village pub and later established a community shop using a Community Interest Purchase (CIP). Peter Cross and David Westley explained how the Case is Altered closed in 2013, and by registering a CIP, were able to purchase the pub and have it up and running by the end of that year. They explained how they engaged with the community by means of a survey to ascertain the level of interest, both in terms of helping to finance the purchase, and volunteering to run it once opened. The pub is now open 5 days a week and has an annual profit of around £11.5k. The investment model uses the Enterprise Investment Scheme, which has attractive tax benefits for investors. Peter Lickert explained that the White Horse pub was currently up for sale for around £350k, plus fixtures and fittings, and had apparently received interest from parties interested in looking at purchasing the pub for alternative use. If there is sufficient interest in purchasing the pub as a village asset, the first step will be to raise a CIP (valid only 6 months from initial decision to sell). A questionnaire will also be included in the May Review in order to gauge the level of support.

Reporting on the Emergency Plan, Peter Lickert outlined the possible communication difficulties, especially with vulnerable individuals, which will result from the move to Digital Voice by BT. The withdrawal of traditional telephone line services will mean that alternative means, such as mobile phones, will need to be used during power cuts. However if an incident was more widespread, say removing connectivity to the mobile network, a solution using amateur radio might be appropriate. To this end Raynet have been approached with a view to trialling their amateur radio service. Michael Paul then gave the Parish Council report for the previous year. He reflected on the fact that there had been no crimes reported for either village, something he hoped would continue. He commented on the increases in residential and industrial development and the pressure being put on an already inadequate road system, and whether the need for a northern lpswich bypass would become inevitable. The final phase of the Scottish Power EA3 project has now commenced and is planned for completion by December, and it is hoped there will be less impact on villagers as much of the infrastructure is already in place. Michael also observed the impact of Sizewell C construction in terms of resources and infrastructure, and the ongoing rollout of wind farms along the coast line. He finished by thanking the Clerk and Parish Councillors, and the Tree Warden and PTLO for their help during the past year.

Reporting on the Accounts, Graham Walker outlined the areas where the Council had either significantly overspent or underspent the budget. The largest overspend was the funding contribution to the Kirton and Falkenham Review, and village website, which has now been baked into future budgets. The largest underspends were due to delays in spending on environmental services (such as replacing the Village Green restricted access pole), and reduction in the Clerk salary and associated expenses following a review in November.

Graham reiterated the policy from earlier years that a key objective of the Council is to continue to grow the Legal reserves in order to contest any future proposed development of Innocence Farm. A complete breakdown is available from the Accounts section of the PC website.

Susan Harvey (through a report read out by Rosie Walker), reporting for the Nassau Trust, said that they held approx £41k of funds. The interest from these funds, plus income from allotments etc, is available to support those in need. She reported there had been only one funded request for help over the last year. There remain three empty allotment plots, available for uptake by interested parties.

John Beer submitted a written report covering the Recreation Ground. He reported that the Pavilion (now over 20 years old), and generally in good condition, noting that the toilets had been redecorated in July. He says that the boiler will need to be replaced in due course, and reserves are being held for this purpose. Kirton Kestrels Football club remain the main users, spending around £1.6k annually. The football pitch renovation project is continuing (with significant funding from the Football Foundation towards the £6k cost), this is a five year project which commenced in 2023. The carpark continues to be a problem area, with flooding after rain, unfortunately the required planning permission has delayed the project to improve the situation with necessary groundworks, but will hopefully be completed this year. The other users of the Pavilion include Pilates, local beekeepers, private parties and of course the Parish Council. The usual "big" events took place last year: Kirton 5m race; Scouts car boot; Radio car boot; Tractor rally; Suffolk Day; Village fete, all continuing to prove popular. The Play area is still well used, and the annual inspection revealed no "high risk" problems, however the "log world" apparatus is being to look a little antiquated (around 35 years old) but would cost approx £20k to replace. John received a vote of thanks, and applause, from the meeting for the significant contribution he makes to the running of the Rec and Pavilion.

Lee Reeves, ES Council, focused on two key issues. The first relates to Planning and the Government directive to increase the housing supply from the previously agreed 905, to 1,644 per year across East Suffolk, amounting to an 82% increase. Unfortunately because ESC will no longer be able to demonstrate a five year supply from Sept 25 according to the new targets, there is an expectation that we will be subject to "Speculative development", whereby plans may now be put forward for substantial developments under the presumption of approval, provided they comply with policies under existing local plans. The second issue concerns the anticipated appointment of a Mayor for Norfolk and Suffolk, and the move to a unitary authority, which will see District and County Councils merged into either two or three councils covering the whole of Suffolk. Depending on the approach taken there could be a range of outcomes, from a reduction in Councillor representation per head of population, to a hoped benefit of a having a single authority responsible for resolving issues.

Lee also highlighted the grant contributions from the Enabling Communities Budget, including locally a £5k grant towards the cost of insulating the main roof of the Village Hall, which still has an uninsulated "cold roof" design dating from over 100 years ago

The local History Recorder for Falkenham, Jo Shaw, reported on the pending departure from Kirton of Jean and Colin Shaw, and Colin's retirement earlier last year following 31 years as Clerk to the PC. Both received a vote of thanks, and applause, from the meeting for the significant contribution they have made during their time in the village. Jo went on to highlight the key things of note over the year including: Completion of electrical installations and pumps for the new reservoir on Drunkards Lane; Various road flooding issues; Northern Lights spectaculars; The removal of the Kirton Village Green phone box; New solar panels installed on Sheepgate Lane; Flooding and resulting mud slide onto the road in Falkenham; Retirement of Andy the postman after 23 years; Falkenham Church snowdrop display.

Jo also mentioned two published books from villagers this year, the first by Ann Quentin, based on her wartime childhood, the second a poetry collection by Stephen Harvey. Jo has started sharing excerpts from old newsletters in the Review, and hopes to organise an exhibition to showcase memorabilia from a former member of the Kirton Football team later this year. In closing Jo noted the sad goodbye to several members of the community over the past year including Maureen Pinner, who organised the Thursday Club for many years, and Eric Maule who assisted and served on many committees over the years. 

<u>Next meeting:</u> 2pm on Thursday 8th May in the Village Hall There will be a moment of remembrance at the beginning of the meeting as it is the 80th anniversary of VE Day. This is our annual meeting to discuss this year's NFWI resolution.



"BYSTANDERS CAN BE LIFESAVERS"

After the discussion there will be a CPR demonstration by the local Air Ambulance team followed by tea and a quiz.

Last month our speaker, Catherine Buchanan, gave a light-hearted talk on table manners beginning with a brief history of their origin.

Eighty percent of the world continue to use hands to eat but simple flint knives and shaped objects like seashells and horns have been used for eating and drinking for thousands of years. It was not until the Middle Ages that eating became more formal. Tressel tables covered with cloth were set up in halls ready for chargers of food. This is the origin of "setting the table". The cloth would be used for hand wiping and all utensils would be shared except for the personally owned knives. This was the beginning of the idea of table manners - no stabbing your neighbour with your knife. Catherine was of course talking about the wealthier members of society not the peasants. The upper classes demonstrated their wealth by owning increasing amounts of cutlery, plates and glass and alongside inventing more table manners. By the 16th century life had become more refined and so were table manners and tableware but guests would continue to use their own cutlery until the 18th century when the host would provide it.

The table manners we know these days are very much from the Victorian era and to demonstrate some Caroline took us through "Tea"; not "Afternoon Tea" as that would be very middle class! One needs a white linen cloth, bone china, sugar tongs, knife and a napkin folded and placed in a specific way. Caroline left us with an interesting thought - you are how you eat!

TIP OF THE MONTH.

Spring foliage is always the most difficult to condition because it is so young and delicate. Always cut your foliage early in the morning while it is still cool and fresh. Large leaves can be floated in a bowl of fresh water. For woody stemmed foliage it is advisably to dip about one inch of the stems in boiling water for a few seconds before plunging into a bucket of deep fresh water. Always remove any leaves that are below the water line.
